Happiness is having different views of New York City from across the Hudson River in Long Island City New York from our terrace...turbulent clouds, glorious sunsets sometimes even "snowflake" clouds and on a clear day, you can see Manhattan! I'm so far away from my island home in Kekaha, Kauai. I think of how far I've traveled...from my birthplace in Sinait, Ilocos Sur, Philippines; growing up in Mana, "God's little acre on Kauai, whereas a young tomboy, I used to climb up our mango tree to dream my dreams. "Someday, I will go beyond these sugar cane fields and never come back," I thought. Then we moved to Kekaha in the summer of 1957, where I was a senior at Waimea High School. I often walked to Kekaha Beach and looked out at the Pacific Ocean and thought, "Someday, I'm going to cross this ocean and never come back!" I wanted so much to travel to see the world beyond the islands. I graduated with the Waimea High School Class of 1958, and finally my dreams were coming to fruition. I was off to Evanston, Illinois to attend Kendall Junior College where I worked my way for two years. After graduation, I met a family, and I became their live-in Nanny for two toddler boys, Eric and Andrew. When the family moved to Minneapolis, Minnesota, they took me with them.

Fast forward a bit...I broke my mother's rule not to talk to strangers and that's how I met my husband, Robert. We eventually got married. We later had two sons, Derek and Carlyle. We lived in Roseville, Minnesota, then to Chicago, Illinois, Washington, D.C., Bethesda, Maryland, then to White Plains, New York. My sons graduated from Harvard and Princeton Universties. My husband finished his "dash" (journey) through life in January 1999 and a year later, my father, Daniel passed away too.
